The Benefits of Adopting Two

- 1. Healthy Playtime & Social Skills.** Two kittens wrestle and chase each other instead of your toes — and learn when enough is enough, something humans simply can't teach as effectively.
- 2. Happier, Less Lonely Kittens.** A pair means constant companionship — less crying at night, less anxiety when you're away, and more confidence in a new home.
- 3. Better Behavior as Adults.** Well-socialized kittens grow into balanced adult cats who are less prone to aggression, overgrooming, or destructive behavior out of boredom.
- 4. Double the Love — Not Double the Work.** Two kittens entertain each other, tire each other out, and don't need you to be their sole playmate. In many ways, two is actually easier than one.
- 5. Cats are social creatures — especially during kittenhood.** Veterinary behaviorists and organizations including the American Association of Feline Practitioners (AAFP) and the Humane Society of the United States all recommend adopting kittens in pairs.

What Is Single Kitten Syndrome?

Single kittens can have behavioral and developmental problems when raised alone. Kittens learn vital social skills — bite inhibition, how to read body language, and how to manage their energy — through rough-and-tumble play with siblings. Without a playmate, all that energy gets directed at you: biting hands and feet, destructive play, excessive meowing, and aggression as they grow older. Children and dogs in the home are not a substitute — these are lessons only another feline can teach.
